Report of the 69th Annual Conference of Indian Library Association on "Building the Future: Transforming Libraries for Sustainability through Capacity Building"

The 69th Annual Conference of Indian Library Association and International Conference was held at Gauhati University during February 1-3, 2024 on the main theme "Building the Future: Transforming Libraries for Sustainability through Capacity Building". The conference was jointly hosted by the Department of Library and Information Science, Gauhati University, Krishna Kanta Handiqui Library, Gauhati University, and Assam Library Association (ALA), Guwahati, Assam.

Day 1: 01/02/2024

The Inaugural Programme of the conference was held at the Phanidhar Dutta Seminar Hall, Gauhati University at 2:30PM with ceremonial lighting of lamp by the Vie Chancellor, Gauhati University Prof. PJ Handique; Prof. Mohan R.Kharde, President ILA; Dr. O.N.Chobey, General Secretary ILA; Prof. Narendra Lahkar, President of the Conference; Prof. Sanjay Kumar Singh, Organizing Secretary, and Prof. M. Koganuramath, Director of the Conference. The "Swaraswati Bandana" was performed by Bhanita Kalita, a student of the Department of Library & Information Science, Gauahati University.

Prof. SK Singh delivered the welcome address. Drawing reference to the prediction of FW Lancaster for a paperless society way back 70 years, which is now going to be realized, he pointed out the challenges before the LIS professionals to face with. Prof. PJ Handiqui, Vice-Chancellor Gauhati University released the proceedings of the conferences, while the souvenir of the conference was released by Prof. AP Singh along with other dignitaries in the dais along with the editor of the souvenir Dr. Bina Medhi Lahkar. Prof. M. Koganuramath Director of the Conference delivering of this speech narrated the sub-themes of the conferences and the evolving trend of LIS which has successfully been accommodating the challenges of time.

Paying homage to Padmashree Dr. SR Rangaanathan, Dr. Mohan R Khede, the President of ILA described a library as the centre of all changes in the society and urged upon all professionals to get adapted with the demands of time. He also expressed confidence that the deliberations in the conferences will shed light on the preparedness of the LIS professionals to meet the challenges of the implementing the NEP 2020.

Prof. N Lahkar, in his speech, expressed hope that the conference will address certain pressing issues like the challenges of job prospects, job status apart from addressing the contemporary academic issues. He further pointed out the requirements of adequate teaching strengths in the LIS schools, orientation & training of teachers while preparing for negotiating the recent changes in LIS and urged professional organizations like ILA to take initiatives in this regard.

Referring to the Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsov being celebrated in the country Prof. AP Singh, Director General of National Library Kolkata expressed hope that the timely initiatives of the GoI to strengthen National Digital Library as well as country wide public library system spanning up to the Gram Panchayats and villages will usher a new era in the country. He advocated that the library service should be included in the concurrent-list in lieu of the preset state list. He further urged for specialized courses in LIS to equip the youngsters toward preparing adequately to address the challenges in the domain of LIS.

Technical Session -1. Digital Transformation for Sustainability
Parallel technical sessions were held in two venues.

First paper in the session was A Case Study of DMB Library in the Context of Digital Transformation for Sustainability by Atul Ramdas Nagarkar, and Shivshankar K. Ghumre presented by the first author. It reports the digital transformation in the library of the Doodhsakhar Mahavidyaly, Bidri, Dist Kolhapur Maharashtra. Role of NLIST Resources in the Implementation of NEP 2020: Bridging the Gap in Academic Resources in College Libraries of Assam authored by Bhabananda Das and Manendra Kumar Singh presented by the first author. The paper highlighted the NEP 2020 as a holistic multidisciplinary approach towards reshaping the education landscape in the country and highlighted the potentialities of the NLIST programme of INFLIB-NET to support in realizing the vision particularly in the Higher Education in the country.

Digital Transformation of Library Resources in Open Universities of India: A Comparative Analysis authored and presented by Bhagyashree Kashyap. The paper presented different e-resources available in the libraries of eight open universities in the country and found dominated by e-books, while the other types of the resources are evenly distributed.

Sustainable Development Goals and Their Impact on libraries: A Comprehensive Analysis by Digbijoy Das and Nipan Haloi presented by the first author. The paper highlighted the emerging areas libraries need to align their plan and programmes towards attainment of the UN Sustainable Development Goals 2030 along with the challenges and opportunities in this regard.

Synergy Between Technology and Sustainability in Universities: Fostering Innovation for a Greener Future: Sustainable Innovation and Technology Gautam Gogoi, Bikika Laloo Tariang presented by the first author. It highlighted how the integration of the modern technologies may stimulate and endorse environmental friendly practices in the higher academic institutions drawing example of the Assam Don Bosco University, Guwahati.

Use of Augmented Reality and Virtual Reality for Sustainable Digital Transformation of Libraries by Hatnei-hoi Changsan, Jiya Das and was presented jointly by the two authors. The paper has identified the different



frontline areas where Augmented Reality (AR) and Virtual Reality (VR) may be implanted in the library environment.

The last paper in the session was Sustainable Libraries in the Central University Libraries of the North-East Region of India authored by Manoj Dahal, Rishabh Sarmah, and Bedanga Ranjan Bora presented by the first author. The paper investigated the components of sustainable library with a special focus on the Green Library standards in the nine central university libraries in the North East India, and discussed the presence of the elements in six libraries.

Technical Session -1 Digital Transformation for Sustainability Parallel Session of the first technical session was held at the AT Hall GU

Sustainable Development of Libraries Through Digital Transformation: A Case Study of IIT Kanpur Library authored by Sonal Singh, Richa Sharma, and presented by the first author. The paper insisted that librarians are always accepting challenges of change since the manuscript age, and today, opted the challenges of digital transformation. The authors affirmed that the same would be addressed successfully by converting the challenges to opportunities.

Sustainable Practices and Approaches in Medical College Libraries of India: A Necessity by Sangeeta Narang, Archana Shukla presented by the first author. The paper narrated the digital resources predominant in the medical college libraries and emphasized on the necessity of the adapting to the resources towards sustainable use by the users.

Perception of Sustainability among College Librarians in West Bengal, India: A study by Sanku Bilas Roy, Moutusi Basak presented by the first author. The paper reported the perceptions of sustainability among the college librarians in West Bengal based on a survey among 15 colleges. 80% of the respondents were found familiar with the UN Sustainable Development Goals and opined that libraries are in the process of transition to realize the SDG by switching from print to electronic resources. The paper also highlighted the constraints in achieving sustainability objectives like fund crunch and lack of commitment from the authorities.

Digital Transformation for Sustainability by Librarian Using Open Educational Resources by Sudhir Ramdas Nagarkar. The paper described different OER and MOOCs and emphasized on promoting the same among the learners of different categories. The paper also reported the experiences of sharing NET-SET guidance among the aspirants through a library website which is very encouraging.

Prolific Digital Transformation of Libraries for Dynamic Information Services Sustainability by Jagtap Vivek K. The paper described different cutting edge technologies pertaining to digital transformation and emphasized on adopting the technologies in the libraries towards enhancing accessibility, relevance & longevity of information resources, thereby ensuring the sustainability of dynamic information services in the digital age. The last paper in the session was Digitization of Manuscript as an approach towards sustainability: A study of College Libraries of Kamrup & Kamrup (M) District by Nabajyoti Das. Nirmal Ranjan Mazumdar, and Kishore Kalita presented by the first author. The paper reported the findings of the survey conducted among 47 colleges in the Kamrup and Kamrup (M) districts of Assam on the status of collection and digitization of manuscripts. It is found that 9 colleges have developed manuscript collection and only 5 have initiated digitization of the manuscripts. The paper has discussed different issues and challenges in digitization of the manuscripts and making it available for public access.

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Day 2: 02.02.2024

The 2nd day programme of the Conference started with lectures on three select topics

Lecture 1

Prof. C. R. Karisiddappa Endowment Lecture by Dr. Tamal Kumar Guha, Librarian, IIT Guwahati (Venue: PD Hall)

The session was started with an introductory note on the institution of the Prof. C. R. Karisiddappa Endowment Lecture by ILA followed by an excerpt on the professional contribution of Prof. Karisiddappa delivered by Prof. DV Singh, the chair of the session.

Dr. Guha started his lecture by giving tribute to Padmashri Prof. S. R. Ranganathan, the father of Library Science in India. In his lecture he emphasized on the Five Laws of Library Science and he linked the laws with library ecosystem. He highlighted that in these laws three core components are there - books, readers and organism. Similarly, library ecosystem is also the interconnected network of these three basic elements. Under the element 'book' he spotted his focus on content creators, content facilitators, aggregators, hosting platforms database service providers, indigenous contents etc. Parallely, he pointed out that incase of selecting content we have to be cautious about the quality, affordability and dynamism.

In regard to the second element 'reader', Dr. Guha emphasized on parameters of content, quality, affordability, browsability, usability, ambiance of the library, etc. Furthermore, for the third component 'organism', he referred to Herbert Spencer's 'Theory of Social Organism'. Spencer's conceptualization of a society as an organism remains one of the contributions to sociological thought with which his name is still routinely associated. He mentioned that social organism is a sociological concept, or model, wherein a society or social structure is regarded as a "living organism". Likewise, library is also indeed a living organism. The various entities comprising a library, such as content, users, infrastructure, services, etc., are examined as how there happens a continuous and persistent interaction among various entities of the society to meet its divers needs. Like an organism, every entities of a library have a function in helping and maintaining the organism's stability and cohesiveness, he observed.

Dr. Guha concluded his lecture with the note that library ecosystem has a lot to offer to the members of our communities, and to realize it, we first have to get their attention, engage them, and then demonstrate how library services can lead an enlightened society.

Lecture 2

The 2nd lecture of the day was on Referencing and citation: an Indian perspective delivered by Dr. Projes Roy, Jt Director Campus of Open Learning, University of Delhi

In his presentation Dr. Projes Roy highlighted the Indian knowledge system and the practice of citation in ancient literatures like Puranas, Upanishadas, verses from Tulsidas and other authors. He also expressed his fear for how the commercial entities (plagiarism check software companies) are storing and stealing the first hand research ideas in the research procedure in the from of plagiarism check. In his deliberation it was also mentioned that open access publishing of research ideas is need of the hour and these can meet up optimum citation for those resources.

Lecture 3

The 3rd lecture of the day was on National Digital Library of India (NDLI): Resource, Services, Access and future directions delivered by Dr. Bablu Chutradhar, Librarian IIT Khargpur

Dr. B Sutradhar, Librarian at IITK, delivered the inaugural lecture on NDLI Phase III, introducing its services to the audience. He highlighted the diverse offerings available to users, emphasizing that all services are accessible free of cost, 24x7, and compatible with both computers and mobile devices. The NDLI serves as a comprehensive repository encompassing various types of libraries, including those in schools, special institutions, and higher education establishments. Dr. Sutradhar elucidated the advantages of NDLI club membership and its potential for maximizing the use of the NDLI resources among the users of different institutions in the country. He provided insights into the technical aspects of metadata creation using automated tools. Additionally, he announced the imminent launch of a new version of NDLI featuring enhanced search options and modifications. Dr. Sutradhar also revealed plans for the development of new ILMS software in the near future on this platform.

Technical Session II: Sustainable Collection Development Venue: PD Hall-GU

The 1st paper of this session was The journey towards sustainability: a study on ebook collection development of Jadavpur University by Debasish Mukherjee and Udayan Bhattacharya presented by the first author. In the presentation, Mukherjee explains the ebook procurement policy in a library system as a part of the collection development policy. Questionnaire and interview methods are followed for the study, and the period covered 2014 to 2023. There is no collection development policy and book selection policy in written form in Jadavpur University, as the paper reveals.

The 2nd paper of this session was resented by Himadri Das on Sustainable collection development in university libraries of Assam accessing the issues in combating Infobesity. This paper tries to find out the sustainable collection development policies in 7 University libraries of Assam. The author reveals that out of the 7 libraries, 6 have their written document procurement policy for the collection development of their libraries. The 3rd paper was on Fostering sustainable development in the university libraries of Assam through web resources and services: an evaluative study by Nandita Barman and Sanka Choudhury presented by Nandita Burman. This paper is based on the study related to the web based resources and other online library services provided by the University libraries of Assam. The authors cover only 12 University libraries including state, central, private and deemed to be university of the state. For this study, related data are collected from the institution's website respectively. Web based services and resources are listed out under different parameters. The study reported that 83.33% of libraries provide a Web OPAC facility, which is one of the basic online services of a library. The role of INFLIBNET for sustainable development of the libraries has also been highlighted in the paper.

The 4th paper was Building up library collection in University libraries of Assam with reference to KK



Handique Library, Gauhati University: a critical analysis by Sewali Bhuyan. This paper highlights the collection development policy of the university library and for this study, different five universities of Assam are selected. The finding shows that the university libraries are trying to increase their collection keeping in views of both faculty and users' demand and the paper reveals that KK Handique Library of Gauhati University is the oldest University library in the North Eastern region and has the highest number of books among the survey libraries. Digital collection development policy has also been chalked out by the author and presents in her presentation.

The fifth paper of the session was The role of librarians in using library campaigns as a strategy for achieving sustainable development goals in India by Rima Hazarika and K G Sudhier, and presented by the first author. This paper, based on 5 objectives, discusses and tries to correlate the library campaign and SDGs as well. The role of librarian in respect has also been presented thoroughly by Rima Hazarika.

The next paper titled Academic libraries community engagement initiative for sustainability: a study on the selected college libraries of Golaghat district, Assam was jointly written by Sanam Das, Imran Hussain and Smita Chetia, presented jointly by the first and third author. This paper is a survey based one and a total of 11 college libraries of Golaghat district of Assam have been covered for study. it is found that 70% of libraries are working for and engaged in community related programme for sustainability. The paper further explained the role of academic libraries in fostering community engagement programs.

The role of Anganwadi workers in disseminating health related information in India: a literature review by Shilpi Das and Santanu Das was the 7th paper in the session. The paper has explored the role of Anganwadi worker in disseminating health related information in India. Accredited Social Health Activists play an appreciated role in disseminating and providing such services specially in real areas in India, the study revealed. Tumpa Saha and Tapan Barhi jointly contributed a paper under title Unveiling the keystone: a comprehensive exploration of behaviour competencies of librarians for fostering sustainable library development presented by the first author. This paper is basically an analytical and qualitative in nature based on the data collected from six govt.-aided general degree college libraries of Darjeeling district of West Bengal., and tried to establish a relationship between sustainable development goals, library and behavioural competencies of librarians.

Parallel Technical Session - III: Community Engagement for Sustainability Venue: AT Hall

Libraries and Librarians as Social Entrepreneurs for Holistic Sustainable Development: A Review of Exemplified Holistic Initiatives by Abhijit Thakuria, Dipen Deka, presented by the first author. The paper demonstrated the Librarians' extended role as the social enterpreneur to bring social transformation in the communities. Paper presenter highlighted some of libraries that have been awarded IFLA green library awards and also mentioned about certain projects on sustainability undertaken in libraries around the world. Presenter opined that Librarians promote sustainability literacy in the communities.

The Needs of Sustainable Community Services: An Analysis with Bir Chandra State Central Library, Agartala by Anjali Saha, Payel Goswami, Sucheta Bhattacharjee was the 2nd paper in the session. This paper is a case study of Bir Chandra State Central Library, Agartala where the paper presenter referred to various functions of sustainable community services. Authors envision Library offering employment opportunities

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that could be a next possibility for promotion of sustainable community services. Libraries offering programs on nutrition and conducting health education programs and so forth for achieving sustainability were also mentioned in the presentation.

The 3rd paper in the session was Community Engagement for Sustainability by the College Libraries of Assam by Bidyut Bikash Boruah, Bibek Talukdar, S. Ravikumar. This paper introduced first the 5p's of Sustainability and then the findings of their questionnaire based study on knowledge of sustainability among the college Librarians of Assam.

Community Radio and Library Sustainability: A Symbiotic Relationship by Dipanwita Roy, Santanu Das presented by the first author was the 4th paper in the session. This paper demonstrated libraries offering facilities to reach the information deprived communities through local radio services. The Presenter offered that such services and facilities will help address local information needs. The challenges in providing and implementing such services were also addressed.

Relational analysis of library blogs of top universities of the world: A systematic study by Kaushik Mazumdar, Deepjyoti Kalita, Dibyajyoti Patgiri. This paper addressed various features of Library Blogs of leading universities of the world based on certain parameters.

Community Engagement in Private Library for Maintenance of Sustainability: A Case Study by Mitali Barman. This paper offered a case study representing the importance of community engagement in a private library.

Sustainable Data Management Through Library Best Practices: A Case Study of Sipajhar College by Nirmali Chakraborty. Various sustainable practices adopted by the library of Sipajhar College have been highlighted in the paper.

Library as a Well-Being Supportive Space: Application of Perma Framework by Pranjal Deka, Moyuri Gogoi. This paper referred to PERMA, a theoretical framework to achieve a friendly and pleasant environment in the library. Adoption of such a framework would encourage the readers' well being.

Innovative Library Services in Library and Information Centres including COVID 19 Period by Shakuntala Dahiya. This paper provided a glimpse to various latest trends in libraries that are going to transform our services in the future. Such as augmented reality, virtual reality, introduction of robotics and drones, cloud computing, mobile technologies in libraries and so forth were mentioned by the paper presenter.

A Comprehensive Analysis on-'Transforming Libraries with Creative Implementation of Sustainable Architecture' by Jagriti Pathak was the last paper in the session. This paper referred to innovative and sustainable library building designs, adoption of solar panels, water harvesting plants, incorporation of roof gardens as some steps towards achieving sustainability in libraries. The 1st paper in the session was Empowering Libraries as Hubs of Environmental Activism: Developing Citizen Science Initiatives for Community Engagement and Sustainable Contributions to Environmental Causes by Amit Kumar, Manashjyoti Deka and Dibanjyoti Buragohain presented by the second and third author. The paper explained the genesis and contemporary importance of the concept 'Citizen Science' which invite collaboration of general public and the scientists to take up scientific works of societal importance.

The 2nd paper in the session was Significance of Green Library in 21st Century Modern Library Services: An Overview by Anindya Bhattacharya. The paper deals with the importance of the concept of Green Library and different standards therein. Green Library initiatives in select libraries in India have also been highlighted in the paper.

In the paper Transforming Libraries for Sustainability Through Green Information Literacy by Dabiangkirang Khonglah, Evangelyne Wanniang and Olivia Kharlukhi, the authors presented the challenges faced by the libraries in providing green information literacy as a part of transforming to sustainability in the libraries.

The 4th paper presented in the session was Sustainable Horizons: Challenges, Disparities, and Strategies for Green Libraries in the Indian Subcontinent by Subham Das and Shreya Thakur. The paper draws an analysis of the global initiatives in the domain of green libraries and Indian initiatives. The authors observed absence of Indian subcontinent countries in the list of prestigious IFLA green library awards.

Environment-friendly architecture and design of libraries: A boon for sustainability by Sushmita Bardoloi deals with the green library building initiatives in eight select colleges in the district of Nagaon and Golaghat in Assam and came out with the challenges in this regard.

The paper under title Let's Go Green Together: The Role of Libraries in Green Literacy Education by Tribeni Pathak and Shikha Das was presented by the first author discussed the concept of green library followed by role of the library authorities and the library managers in promoting green library initiatives as a measure to achieve sustainability.

Bibliometric Analysis and Network Visualization of Global Research Trends in Green Libraries (1985-2023) by Naeem Ezaz, Trinayan Borgohain was the last paper in the session. The paper reported the global research trend on green libraries based on a dataset drawn from the Scopus database during 1986-2023.

The 1st paper in the session was Sustainability of libraries: The Tri - Junction of Past, Present and Future by Banani Das. Drawing reference to the concept of sustainability, this paper identified environmental aspects,

social equity, and economic viability in the context of library resources and services. A plan for achieving sustainability in the libraries has also been proposed in the paper.

The 2nd paper in the session was by Chinmay Sarma, Shyamal Baishya, Gajendra Ballav Devchoudhury under title A Web of Science based bibliometric analysis of research on Sustainable Library Practice. This paper presented a landscape of the contemporary research on Sustainable Library Practices based on a dataset of 252 papers drawn from the Web of Science indexing and citation database.

Dipika Das presented the 3rd paper in the session under title Women Librarians' Adaptability in Transforming the New Environment of College Libraries in NEP 2020: A Study. This paper identified and assessed skills of the women librarians towards handling the technologies drawing reference to the preparedness to the challenges paused by the implementation of NEP 2020.

Nikhil Hazarika, Debabrat Senapati, and Sangita Saikia presented their observation on library apprenticeship under title Prospects and Challenges in LIS Apprenticeship: A Study. The authors advocated consideration of the apprenticeship as a doorstep of vibrant LIS profession and urged for opening more opportunities in this regard.

Nishant Kashyap Ghatowar, Rajib Kalita and Shyamanta Boro shared the experiences of implementing the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in the central library of Cotton University, Guwahati, Assam under title Localizing United Nations Sustainable Development Goals: The Case of Dr.Suryya Kumar Bhuyan Library, Cotton University. The authors observed that there need a continuous involvement and sustained effort to realize the SDGs in the libraries.

The 6th paper in the session was Climate Change Resilience and Adaptation in Libraries: A Conceptual Case Study for Sustainable Contributions to a Better World by Rajesh Chutia and Punam Nath.

Rosy Chakraborty and Jaba Moni Das presented the 7th paper in the session under title Futuristic Approach for Sustainability in Krishna Kanta Handiqui Library, Gauhati University (KKHL, GU): A Case Stud. The authors proposed a plan for implementing Green Library concepts in the KKHL, GU.

The 8th paper in the session was From Concept to Practice: Investigating the 3R Model Implementation for Sustainable Waste Management at TISS Guwahati by Sudipta Kalita, Sanjay Kumar Singh, Barasha Sarma and Nasiur Rahman. The paper discussed the 3R model (Reduce, Reuse and Recycle) that is capturing attention for its holistic approach to sustainable challenges. The paper reported the implementation of the 3R model in the TISS University Campus at Guwhati.

The last paper in the session was presented by Parimita Bezbaruah the paper under title Learning from the Leaders: Strategies of Fundraising for Public Libraries in Assam. This paper reported the successful stories and strategies of fundraising through crowd funding by select public libraries in the USA. Taking cognizance of certain constraints as well as potentialities, the author has drafted the roadmap for fundraising through mass involvement of different stack-holders for fundraising in the public libraries in Assam.

Total 97 papers were selected for the conference distributed under eight sub-themes was presented in parallel sessions in two venues. Total 63 papers were presented being the paper presentation percentage is 65. All the sessions of the conference were highly engaging.

The paper reported the findings from their survey about the use of web technology in the college libraries of Assam and asserted that the use of web technology implementation requires a proper guideline or framework for the college libraries of Assam.

The 2nd paper in the session was Role of Web Technologies in Building Sustainable Future of Libraries by Phulasmita Nath, Parismita Hazarika, and P. Hangsing presented some case studies that highlights positive side of sustainable use of web technology under the SDGs of UN.

Sagarika Medhi, Mathias Swargiary & Sanjeev Kalita discussed about the use and awareness of AI tools like ChatGPT among the students and reports that the use of ChatGPT in their paper Exploring the Impact of ChatGPT on Knowledge Acquisition and Learning Motivation: A Study on Users Perspective. It is reported that ChatGPT is still at a nascent stage of use among the students due to their less awareness of about the technology.

The last paper in the session was presented by Saroj Kr Mandal under title An Integration of SMAC Technologies in Library Management and Services: A Study of selected Higher Institution Libraries of Assam authored by the presenter and Sanjay Kr Singh. The paper reported their findings about the use of SMAC (Social Media, Mobile Technologies, Analytics and Cloud Computing) technologies in various aspects of library management and reports the adoption attitude from the Higher Education Institutions of Assam.

This paper explored upon the Vastu Shastra principles highlighting the sustainable tenants which could be applied in library architecture and design. The potential benefits of the adoption of Vastu Shastra in sustainable library buildings has also been highlighted in the paper.

The 2nd paper in the session was presented by Surendra Kumar Pal under title An Overview on sustainable architectural design for Library Building: Issues and Opportunities authored by Payel Goswami, Surendra Kumar Pal, Sudip Bhattacharjee. A theoretical exposition on the concept of sustainable architectural design in terms of principles and application in green library building has been presented in the paper. The importance of green libraries, their standards, issues and technology has also been discussed in the paper.

The 3rd paper in the session was presented by Swati S. Toraskar paper under title Sustainable Architecture and Design. The paper discussed the concept of Green Library exploring into the potential benefits of sustainable design and architecture.

The last paper in the session was Sustainable development and libraries: the emerging idea of Green Libraries by Babita Kalita. The paper discussed about the roles of the librarians towards transforming libraries into green libraries. The potential benefits of green library towards sustainability have also been addressed in the paper.

The 1st paper in the session was Research performance of IIT Kanpur and IIT BHU during the period 2013-2022: a comparative study by Aman Verma and Babita Jaiswal. The paper reported the research publication trend of IIT Kanpur and IIT BHU based on a dataset retrieved from the Web of Science database. Highest collaborating country is found to be the USA.

Do articles get more citations if we share on social media? An investigation through Altmetric lens by Bwsrang Basumatary, Manoj Kumar Verma. The study reported the citation pattern of two coveted LIS journals namely DESIDIC Journal of Library & Information Science and Annals of Library & Information Studies during 2019-2023 based on Altemetric Attention Score (AAS). It is reported that AAS and Citation count depicts a week positive correlation.

Evaluating Scholarly Communication on Sustainable Data Security in Library Systems by Gargi Dhali and Tapan Barui, presented by the first author was the 4th paper in the session. The paper discussed the trend of research on data security, library privacy and security, ethics and privacy in library users data protection based on a dataset of 185 research papers derived from the Scopus.

The last paper in the session was A Website Analysis of Selected State University Library Portals of Assam by Mathias Swargiary, Sanjeev Kalita, Sagarika Medhi. The study reported the results of the content analysis of ten state university library websites. It is observed that some of the university library websites lack basic information about the library.

In the paper Mapping of Research Productivity in the area of Diabetes Mellitus type 1 during the period 2018-2022: Scientometric study presented by Richa Arya and Babita Jaiswal has provided a comprehensive global overview and identify research trends in the field of Type 1 Diabetes Mellitus. The authors retrieved dataset from the Web of Science database between 2018-2022 for investigation. The paper reported the top

20 most prolific authors, Institutions, highly productive countries and highly productive Journals. Authors have found that Wang Y. has emerged as top ranking author, while the Harvard Medical School is the most cited organization. China is the most productive country and the 'Frontiers in Endocrinology' is the most productive journal.

The 2nd paper in the session was Author's gender and citation in open access publications: A study of DESI-DOC journal of library and Information Technology by Swagota Saikia and Manoj Kumar Verma presented by the first author. The paper has mapped the gender of the authors in LIS literatures published in the DE-SIDOC Journal of Information Technology published during 2018 - 2023. The findings revealed that the number of publications have been decreasing since 2021 in the journal and the contribution female authors' is found to be less than the male authors and the citations per paper is less in case of female authors.

The last paper in the session was Towards Sustainable Metadata Arrangement using Ranganathan's Normative Principle in Shodhganga Thesis Repository by Vinay Anand and Saptarshi Ghosh, presented by the first author. The paper attempted to establish the relevance of Normative Principles of Ranganathan's towards metadata arrangement in Shodhganga Repository. In order to demonstrate an application of Normative Principles, the study investigates the local level metadata structure of the Shodhganga thesis repository. The paper portrays a faceted approach model for categorising thesis keywords into facets. It also shows metadata sustainability and discoverability, the reconciliation with Wikidata and creation of Wikidata Schema. The study has found inconsistencies in approach terms categorization. The authors have suggested using faceted controlled vocabularies for approach term representation and Wikibase for metadata sustainability.

Initiating the discussion Prof. Chandel pointed out the contemporary challenges of LIS inviting the issues of mushrooming growth of LIS schools and lamented that one way the diploma courses are still being offered by different institutions, on the other the Masters programs are yet to be tuned up to meet the challenges of the real world job challenges.

Prof. D.V. Singh:

Inviting reference to the contemporary challenges before the domain of LIS more particularly the standard of teaching & learning in the LIS schools, as well as the management of resources and services in libraries Prof. Singh urged for a exploring the possibilities for staging a platform for holistic deliberations among all stakeholders, more particularly the LIS schools, LIS professional organizations in the country at different levels. Referencing to the successful stories of addressing the challenges paused before the LIS sector at large, he expressed hope that the same will be invigorated in the days to come.

Prof. M. Koganuramath:

Drawing reference to the pace of the transition the LIS sector has witnessed over the last few decades, Prof. Koganuramath expressed his eccentricity on where we will be, if timely actions are not initiated and pursued in right direction. He expressed his agreement with the previous speakers for a national level initiative towards addressing the challenges identified in the deliberations, more particularly to be led by organizations like ILA.

Prof. N Lahkar:

Prof. Lahkar focused on the urgent need of uniform curriculum framework for different LIS programmes in the country towards enforcing standardization of teaching & learning, and urged the associations like ILA to take necessary initiatives in this regard. Inviting attention to the issue of inadequate communication skills of the LIS graduates, he marked this as a major constraint paused before the LIS graduates while cracking interviews and other recruitments tests. Accordingly, he laid stress for a special attention from the part of the LIS schools to adopt appropriate strategies in this regard.

Dr. Pradeep Rai:

Drawing reference to the job opportunities and status of different positions of LIS jobs in the country, Dr. Rai lamented that so many things are not in the hands of Associations like ILA, rather in the hands of the policy makers. He echoed the observations of Prof. Lahkar of the fact that thousands of LIS schools are producing LIS graduates of different levels, which he termed responsible for directly or indirectly contributing to a compromising attitude in the run for jobs. He further presented an excerpt of the activities that ILA have continuously been pursued in terms of representations to each and every Pay Review Commissions, NCERT authorities, and other national commissions, bodies, etc. on the status of different LIS positions and opening up newer opportunities.

Dr. Subhash Chauhan:

Dr. Chauhan echoed his agreement to the observations of the panelist and urged for a coordinated approach among different LIS schools, organizations and associations in the country for identifying the issues on the by-line of priority in one hand, while adopting appropriate strategies to involve the policy makers, other philanthropic organizations and citizenry at different level for their realizations, on the other.

Valedictory Session:

Soon after the panel discussion, the Valedictory Session of the Conference was held at the same venue, i.e. GUIST Conference Hall, Gauhati University.

Prof. Bhabesh Chandra Goswami, ex-vice-chancellor of Cotton University Gauahti shared the dais as Chief Guest along with the dignitaries in the Panel Discussion. Prof. Goswami highlighted the role of the LIS schools in training the LIS graduates to make them equip with the adequate skills to negotiate the challenges of the information age today. Prof. Narendra Nath Sharma, Retrd. Professor, Department of Library and Information Science, Gauhati University shared the dais as distinguished octogenarian teacher and blessed the house with his treasure of wisdom.

Recommendations

The recommendations of the Conference have been noted down as follows

- 1. The deliberations of the conference, more particularly the session of panel discussion voiced in unison that the Standardization of LIS programmes being offered by different Universities and Institutions is a dire need to enforce equitable quality of the teaching and aptitudes of the graduates towards addressing the contemporary challenges in the domain of LIS which the conference achieving sustainability. Since two decades have been passed the last curriculum development committee on LIS was formed by the UGC, it is high time to re-constitute a committee for the purpose.
- 2. The conference addressed at length the issues of the mushroom grown of LIS schools and LIS programmes being offered at different levels by Universities and Institutions in the country sans any standardization of the programmes. Accordingly, the conference stood in unison for drafting an appropriate policy and mechanism to put an end to the mushrooming growth of LIS schools and corresponding deleterious effects on the LIS profession at large.
- 3. Admitting the urgent need for accreditation of LIS Schools in the country, the conference recommended for initiating necessary dialogues and liaisons among all stackholders in the domain.
- 4. The conference addressed the issue of the recent deviations from the principle of equitable salary and status of different LIS job across the country. In this regard, it is recommended that this issue should also be dealt with its due weight alongside the proposed deliberations for standardization of LIS programmes and status of the jobs.
- 5. The conference agreed to the proposition that the week coordination among different LIS associations & organizations is one of the major constraints in raising the common issue of interest at national level. The conference agreed that the ILA may shoulder the responsibility to re-invigorate the necessary platform for harnessing the much needed cordial and regular interaction among different associations in the country.
