

Message from Dr O N Chaubey, General Secretary ILA




Honourable ILA Members,

Information-Seeking Behavior of Divyang Students in Non-Agricultural Universities in Maharashtra

Higher education is a process that is broader and more complex and leads to growing up, not just as an internal process of education but also as actors and institutions. It means acquiring knowledge and enhancing one's thinking and performance skills socially relevant. However, for Divyang persons, the process is usually more arduous and more cumbersome for them.

Several inclusive policies and laws have been framed in India to boost inclusive education. However, many of the educational institutions do not provide adequate academic, technical, or infrastructural support to Divyang students. Even in the face of a growing impact of information technology, the expansion of digital education, and the application of inclusive policies for access to use of information, Divyangs face many barriers.

Maharashtra is a non-agricultural university that is important in the functions related to higher education. These universities cater to the learning interests of the students of different backgrounds and contribute to the research and innovation. As of today, very little research has been done on the information-seeking behavior of Divyang students in these institutions. It is very important to understand how these students are gaining access to information; what kind of challenges they face in accessing information; how these students have utilized the resources available to them; and what barriers they are facing in accessing information.

The purpose of this study is in-depth analysis of information-seeking behavior among Divyang students in non-agricultural universities in Maharashtra. This research will develop a better environment in higher education institutions for inclusive, accessible learning in terms of the findings that will be discovered regarding the challenges faced, preferences of information gathering, and information seeking habits. It will also provide a model framework to improve educational management, library services, digital learning tools, and policy formulation towards a better schema of knowledge acquisition and accessibility for Divyang students.

One-Week National Workshop on "Emerging Trends & Technologies in Libraries"

He also extended his warm reception to all the resource persons and participants. During his address Dr Shivarama stressed the need of using the open source software's, particularly KOHA, DSpace, Mendeley etc. He urged the library professionals to equip themselves with the latest technology and serve the users more effectively and efficiently.

Immediately after the inauguration, the training sessions began. The resource person Dr Shivarama briefed about the open sources; KOHA and conducted hands on practical sessions on 27 & 28 Jan 2025 and DSpace practical sessions on 29 & 30 Jan 2025. The resource person Dr Satish Kanamadi, University Librarian, TISS, Mumbai gave overview of the Artificial intelligence Technology and engaged the practical sessions on 30 Jan 2025 and Mendeley an online reference management tool on 31 Jan 2025. Dr Shivarama engaged hands on session on Drupal an open source content management software on 31 Jan 2025. During the Valedictory program on 31 Jan 2025, Dr Manoj Joseph, Sr Faculty & Member of Library Advisory Committee (LAC) in his presidential remark expressed concern of use & misuse of information by the students and challenges to detect the plagiarized contents. He cautioned the teachers as well as library professionals to be alert and keep themselves up to date. Thereafter, the participants shared their feedback. The curtain came down for the one-week national workshop with proposing of vote of thanks by Dr Veeresh Hanchinal, workshop convener.

One Day Seminar On "Shaping the future Libraries".

A one-day Seminar on Shaping the future Libraries conducted on 8th February,2025 10.30am onwards. Venue at Senate Hall, Vidyasoudha block, Karnatak University, Dharwad, Karnataka state. 50 delegates registered and actively participated in this Seminar. No registration fee was collected.

The seminar started with invocation at 10.30 a.m. The dignitaries on the stage lit the lamp. Dr Ramesh R.Naik , Senior Professor and Chairman welcomed the gathering. The dignitaries were honored with flower bouquet .Dr.C.R.Karisiddappa UGC – Emeritus Professor(Retd) Karnatak University , the Chief Guest of Inaugural function spelt out the dynamics of the seminar. In the second technical session Dr.Nagappa V.Bakkannanavar Branch Head, Tata Consultancy Services, Bengaluru gave a talk on Visualization of future Librarianship, define your destiny with new skills. After this talk Dr.K. Umeshareddy Librarian & Head JRD Tata Memorial Library, IISC, Bengaluru spoke on Scholarly Communication and Artificial Intelligence.

In the third technical session Dr.SantoshKumar, Professor, Kuvempu University, Shankaghatta talked on Redefining Learning Spaces in Libraraies. Later SriIrappaPattar, Librarian, JSS KHK Institute of Engg, Dharwad gave a talk on Future Librarianship skills attitude and information handling.

As a consequence of advances in ICT, libraries are changing rapidly. The library industry is now practically a web-based industry. In the meantime, the library and information science communities are on duty to meet their knowledge and information needs by using their mobile devices, which are serviced by commercial firms.

Professor Vishvanath Dean of Law and Chairman Department of Law KUD delivered the valedictory address. He mentioned the role of memory power which existed before print media and advised the Librarians to develop their reading habit to serve the users in an effective way. Dr.C.Krishnamurthy proposed the vote of thanks by acknowledging the supportive roles played by the management, staff, delegates and sponsors. The participants after giving out their formal feed-back received their participation certificates. The seminar came to an end with snacks and tea.

National Conferenceon "Envisioning the Future: Al Tools for Libraries

Dnyanprassarak Mandal's College and Research Centre, Assagao, recently hosted a two-day national conference on "Envisioning the Future: Al Tools for Libraries" on 20th and 21st February 2025. Organized under the leadership of Dr. Jayaprakash G. Hugar, Librarian of the college and Organizing Secretary, the conference was inaugurated by Prof. Devika Madalli, Director, INFLIBNET, Gandhinagar, Gujarat. Prof. Madalli highlighted the crucial services provided by INFLIBNET to colleges across India, with special emphasis on its impact in Goa. The event commenced with a soulful invocation dedicated to Goddess Saraswathi, followed by a welcome address by Prof. D.B. Arolkar, Principal of the College, who acknowledged the conference as a significant milestone in the institution's Golden Jubilee celebrations.

Dr. Jayaprakash G. Hugar elaborated on the conference theme, tracing the evolution of library science from traditional print media to Al-driven digital repositories. He invoked Dr. S.R. Ranganathan's Fifth Law, "Library is a Growing Organism," to underscore the transformative impact of Al on modern libraries. A key highlight of the event was the launch of the "Library ChatBot," an advanced virtual assistant designed to enhance user interaction with library services. The chatbot was inaugurated by the Chief Guest, Prof. Madalli, who commended the college's innovative approach. She also released the conference volume on "Al – Driven Libraries: Shaping the Future of Knowledge Management" on this occasion.

The Guest of Honour, Prof. C.R. Karisiddappa, Former Professor and Chairman, DLISc, Karnatak University, Dharwad, delivered an insightful address on the evolution of information retrieval systems, citing historical advancements from Gutenberg's printing press to modern Al applications in libraries. He acknowledged Al's potential in revolutionizing library services while addressing concerns regarding employment, emphasizing that technological advancements, much like the advent of computers, would create new opportunities.

Prof. Devika Madalli's keynote address detailed INFLIBNET's contributions, including initiatives like Shodhganga, INDCAT, ePgPathshala, BharatCat, ShodhaChakra, and Sherni, which empower academic research and women researchers in India. She also noted the integration of the SOUL software into an open-source model, now used by 172 university libraries. She lauded the participation of Goan colleges in INFLIBNET's initiatives and congratulated the college on its ChatBot innovation. During the conference, a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between Shri Prasada Lolayekar, Secretary, Department of Education, Government of Goa, and Professor Devika Madalli, Director, INFLIBNET, Gandhinagar, in the presence of Dr. Keshav Dhuri, Assistant Director, Directorate of Higher Education; Prof. D. B. Arolkar, Principal and Dr. Jayaprakash, Librarian of the Dnyanprassarak Mandal's College and Research Centre along with Dr. Bala Mandrekar, Librarian of Zantye College, at the Secretariat of the Government of Goa. The MoU facilitates the provision of all INFLIBNET services free of cost to the colleges affiliated with the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Goa.

The technical sessions covered various facets of AI in library science. Dr. P.G. Tadasad presented a theme paper on "AI in Collection Management," exploring AI's role in budgeting, cataloguing, metadata evolution, and ethical challenges. Dr. Ramesh R. Naik's session on "AI for Information Retrieval and Discovery" highlighted applications in search engines, facial recognition, surveillance, and streaming services. Further presentations included Dr. Sunil M.V. on "AI-Driven User Experience" and Dr. T.S. Kumbar on "AI and Library Workforce Transformation."

A highlight of the conference was the exceptional contribution by Prof. Ashok Y. Asundi, the esteemed Rapporteur General of the conference. His comprehensive and detailed report masterfully encapsulated the essence of the discussions, providing a thorough and insightful summary.

During the valedictory function of the two-day national conference, the Chief Guest, Dr. Sandesh Desai, University Librarian, Goa University, delivered an insightful address highlighting the transformative role of Artificial Intelligence in libraries. He emphasized the importance of adopting emerging technologies in library services to enhance efficiency and provide the best possible services to users within the shortest possible time.

The conference concluded with a set of resolutions emphasizing four key areas: the pros and cons of AI applications in libraries, education and training requirements for AI integration, innovative practices in AI tool development, and strategies to address potential employment concerns. The event was a grand success, fostering discussions on the future of AI in libraries and reinforcing the college's role as a pioneer in academic innovation. Dr. Umesh Gawas delivered the vote of thanks, expressing gratitude to the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Goa, the college management, faculty, and staff for their invaluable support.

UN Charter Libraries Knowledge Network*March 2025

The United Nations Dag Hammarskjöld Library put forward a proposal for a UN Charter Libraries Knowledge Network, a network that will collaboratively reenvision the work and nature partnerships among affiliated libraries with the United Nations. This is a strategic re-positioning that aims to leverage the existing UN Depository Library Programme into a new, robust, inclusive knowledge network focused on founding document of the Organization, the UN Charter, and all the UN actions emanating from it.

The Network will align closely with the UN Global Principles for Information Integrity within the context of the Pact for the Future and the associated Global Digital Compact and Declaration on Future Generations.

The Dag Hammarskjöld Library launched a global consultation, encouraging feedback from individuals, libraries, professional organizations and other knowledge organizations.

The Dag Hammarskjöld Library team is working on analyzing and consolidating your invaluable inputs which will be considered in the development of the UN Charter Libraries Knowledge Network.

Reclaiming Academic Publishing: The Launch of the Open Journals Collective The Open Journals Collective (OJC), an equitable, sustainable, community-led alternative to the big deals and transformative agreements offered by corporate academic publishers was launched recently. The OJC is a collective of libraries and university-based publishers working to change the way academic research is supported and disseminated. Drawing on more than a decade of digital publishing innovation, the OJC confronts the crisis in academic journal publishing with a viable path toward bringing publishing back in-house at universities. A large collection of hundreds of diamond open access journals in the humanities and social sciences in January 2026 will be launched.

The OJC Library Board includes library directors, intellectual property specialists, and open research leaders from institutions such as lowa State University, Princeton University, the University of Edinburgh, Harvard University, MIT, Yale University, Lancaster University, the University of York, the University of Cambridge, the National Library of Scotland, the University of Sussex, and the University of St Andrews.Publishers that have already joined the OJC include the Open Library of Humanities, LSE Press, UCL Press, the University of Michigan Press, the California Digital Library, and Edinburgh Diamond at the University of Edinburgh — with more publishers joining soon. While we are primarily based in the US, Canada, and the UK, we are also actively working with colleagues in Europe and beyond.

The World Book Fair on that day, during February 8, afforded marvellous excitement with the very vast exhibits of books from various countries and in different languages. Various stalls were set up for well-known publishers like Diamond Books, Sahitya Akademi, Scholastic, and National Book Trust; the Russian and Turkish publishing houses were among the crowd-pullers. Instead of buying books, they focused on information about the fair and visiting various stalls.

Panel discussions and special interaction sessions on several genres were organized. An interactive meeting with authors and publishers was thus an excellent opportunity to learn about the publishing world.

February 9 was completely booked for acquiring book purchases. They got one original copy of the Indian Constitution and quite a number of academic books for the college library. They also gone through the shelf of literature from Sahitya Akademi, Kolonge International, Upkar Publications, Prakash Books, and Atlantic Publishers as well as the other Indian and international publishers. They had information regarding academic reference books, guides to competitive examinations, and rare pieces of literature

Space Management in Libraries



We should take inspiration from the Göttingen University Library, which exemplifies thoughtful interior design that enhances the reading experience. The library avoids flashy, colorful walls and furniture, opting instead for a calm, minimalist aesthetic. The interior features proper high book racks, strategically placed reading areas next to the shelves for easy access to resources, and personalized reading spaces designed for individual comfort. Each reader's space is equipped with its own reading light, allowing for focused illumination without causing eye strain. Ample natural light floods the library, creating a warm and inviting atmosphere that fosters concentration.

Such design choices create an environment that promotes focus, comfort, and a genuine love for reading. As librarians, we should advocate for renovations that prioritize the needs of readers, focusing on creating serene, organized, and reader-friendly interiors.
